Description

The multi-unit frame house is one-and-one-half stories with upright and wing massing, "T" shaped plan and a gabled addition. The street elevation is the side of the house, with the formal front elevation facing east. The front gabled plan spans two bays wide by four bays deep. The first floor is set on a parged masonry foundation and the walls are clad in siding. An internal brick chimney is located on center at the roof junction. The upright façade, facing east, is symmetrical with two windows at the first floor and a pair of windows in the gable. The arrangement is repeated at the west gable end wall. Along the north elevation are two irregularly spaced single-leaf entrance doors, two pairs of windows and two small eave windows. The wing is three bays wide by two bays deep. At the northeast inside corner, a single-leaf door has been replaced and is located at a low concrete stoop. Over the door there is a short mansard porch canopy supported by an elaborately turned bracket. Many of the windows have been replaced, with some 6/1 double-hung wood windows remaining at the northwest corner. On the rear elevation there is a one story gabled addition that is possibly an original kitchen wing. Set at the south...

Description

The multi-unit frame house is one-and-one-half stories with upright and wing massing, "T" shaped plan and a gabled addition. The street elevation is the side of the house, with the formal front elevation facing east. The front gabled plan spans two bays wide by four bays deep. The first floor is set on a parged masonry foundation and the walls are clad in siding. An internal brick chimney is located on center at the roof junction. The upright façade, facing east, is symmetrical with two windows at the first floor and a pair of windows in the gable. The arrangement is repeated at the west gable end wall. Description

The Queen Anne, single-family frame house is two stories with a steeply pitched cross-gabled roof and a side-facing "T" shaped plan. The first floor is raised on a coursed limestone foundation, the exterior is clad in siding, and an internal brick chimney is centrally located. At the primary elevation, facing north, a gable-front section with centered window openings and a canted bay projects out. To the east, the two-story side gable wing has a gabled wall dormer and canted first floor. Below the dormer, the main entrance is located at a concrete stoop. The single-leaf entrance was remodeled as a mid-century Colonial Revival assembly with sidelights, fluted pilasters and large dentils. The east and south elevation gable windows are typically centered with a canted first floor at the southwest corner. A one story gabled wing is located at the rear elevation and has early 20th century wood windows. Typical windows are single, tall, 1/1 double-hungs with rectangular sash, many of which remain. The frames have been clad and small rectangular basement windows pierce the foundation. Alterations and a lack of surviving decoration obscure the sub-type of this Queen Anne house and have compromised its integrity.

Description

The Greek Revival, single-family house is two stories with a hipped roof and a two bay square plan. The foundation and walls of the main massing are covered in stucco and a brick chimney is located at the northwest corner. A wide cornice board encircles the shallow eaves. At the primary elevation, facing south, there is a full-width porch with a hipped roof. Two thirds of the porch is enclosed and lined with bands of 6/1 wood double-hung windows. The remaining third is a recessed open porch at the front entry door. Large square columns support the roof, and the single-leaf half-lite and paneled entry door is contemporary with the porch addition. Above the porch, two evenly spaced window opening have been cut short by the porch roof. Several other irregularly spaced windows at the secondary facades have also been replaced with several generations of double-hung windows. At the rear elevation, a one story hipped roof addition with concrete block foundation has a one-and-one-half story gabled connection to the second floor. The addition is covered in stucco with early 20th century wood windows, and an enclosed gabled porch is attached at the northwest corner. Small rectangular basement windows pierce...

Description

The single-family home is one-and-one-half stories tall with a front-gabled roof and a rectangular plan spanning two bays wide and deep. The first floor is raised on a parged masonry foundation, the walls are clad in siding, and a brick chimney is located at the southwest corner. The front façade, facing north, has a door to one side and two windows at the first floor with two windows centered above. The Victorian era front porch is set at a low concrete stoop with a short mansard roof, spindlework brackets, and square posts. The single-leaf front entrance door is paneled with a half lite. The front gable has short cornice returns and scalloped trim and spindlework has been added to the eaves. Windows are evenly spaced at the sided walls. An original one story gabled rear wing extends to the south and has short cornice returns at the gable end wall. Shed roof additions and enclosed porches have been added at the wing's east and west sides. All the original windows have been replaced with 1/1 double-hungs. The property is dotted with several small gabled outbuildings, most prominently a small two story carriage house. It is clad in siding and has a clipped gable roof with double-hung windows in the gables...

Description

The single-family home is one-and-one-half stories tall with upright and wing massing. The first floor set on a parged masonry foundation, the walls are clad in siding, and a brick chimney is located on the west elevation. The front gable, facing south, has centered window openings: a Chicago style window at the first floor and a pair of 1/1 double-hung windows at the second floor gable. This section is two window bays deep, with evenly spaced windows at the first floor and shorter windows at the eaves. The long side wing is one bay deep, and an enclosed entry porch is situated on a concrete slab at the wing's south elevation. It has a shed roof and is lined with 3-lite louvered windows. The front entry door is not visible. At the rear elevation, there is a shed roof addition and a hipped roof enclosed porch to the north. Many of the original 2/2 double-hung wood windows with simple framing remain. Many have had mid-20th century metal awnings installed. A two car, hipped roof garage is located at the north edge of the property. It is clad in siding and has a band of multi-lite windows. The size and configuration suggest that this is a late settlement dwelling with Greek Revival detailing, many of which have been modified.

Description

The Queen Anne, single-family frame house is two stories with a steeply pitched cross-gabled roof. The first floor is raised on a parged foundation, the exterior is clad in siding, and a brick chimney is centrally located. At the primary elevation, facing south, there is a gable-front section with centered window openings and a canted first floor. A large landscape window is at the first floor, with a pair of 1/1 double-hung window at the second floor. A one-story enclosed gabled front porch is situated to the east side. It has a brick and concrete base, a single-leaf entrance door, octagonal window and a metal awning. The east and west elevation gable windows are typically centered. A one-story hipped-roof wing is located at the rear elevation. Typical windows are single, tall, 1/1 double-hungs with rectangular sash, many of which remain. Some frames retain decorative corner block, but many have been clad. Small rectangular basement windows pierce the foundation. At the north edge of the property there is a mid-20th century one car garage clad in siding with vertical boards in the gable end. Description

The single-family dwelling is one-and-one-half stories with a steeply pitched side-gabled roof and rectangular, one-room deep plan. The first floor is raised on a parged masonry foundation and the exterior is clad in siding. The primary elevation, facing south, there are three bays. A one-story gabled front porch is situated off-center at a concrete stoop, and has a simple wood railing. The single-leaf entrance door is a replacement. The west elevation has one centered window at each floor, while the east elevation has an off-center window at the first floor and a centered window at the second floor. A one story hipped roof entrance is located at the rear elevation. Typical windows are single 1/1 double-hungs with rectangular sash, many of which have been replaced. The frames have been clad and faux shutters added. Small rectangular basement windows pierce the foundation. At the north edge of the property there is a mid-20th century one-car garage clad in siding with vertical boards in the gable end. The size and configuration suggest that this turn of the century I-house had simple detailing. Much of the home's original fabric has been altered, compromising its integrity.

Description

The Colonial Revival, single-family brick home is two stories tall with a rectangular footprint, a symmetrical façade of five window bays and a side-gabled roof. 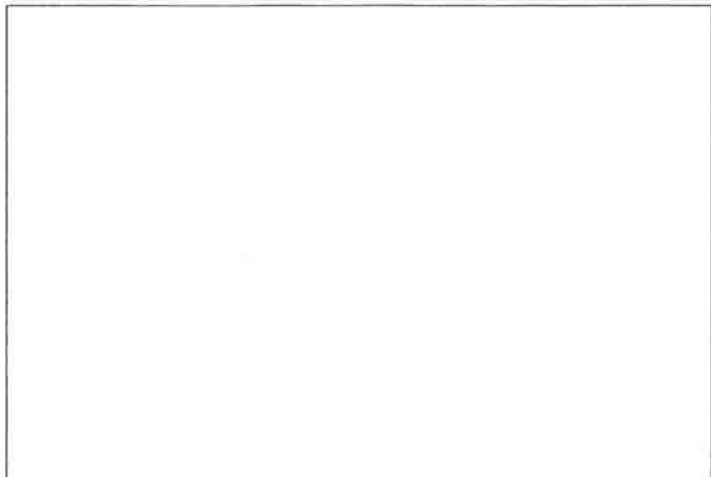

Description

The one-and-one-half story frame Bungalow cottage has a rectangular footprint and a broad side gabled roof with deep eaves. Though modified, this cottage Bungalow has maintained moderate integrity.

Description

The Queen Anne cottage is one-and-one-half stories with a cross gabled roof and plan. The first floor is raised on parged masonry foundation and the walls are clad in wood clapboards with corner boards. An internal brick chimney is located on center at the gable junction. At the primary elevation, facing south, there is a shaped front gable section with a one story front porch. Set on a concrete slab stoop, square posts support a flat roof. A single-leaf side entry door has one full lite, and a picture window assembly with flanking double-hungs is adjacent off center. Above is a pair of centered double-hung windows. The east/west cross gables have a shingled spandrel with typically centered window placement at the second floor with irregularly placed window groupings at the first floor. Description

The single-family standard Ranch home is one story tall with a hipped roof and rectangular plan. The walls are set on a concrete foundation and clad in a pink brick veneer with an internal brick chimney on center at the rear elevation. Description

Constructed of gray granite, it has a stepped, square base with sloping corner braces and orbs. The low inscription panel is decorated with Union Shields and bands of five-point stars. Four Doric columns rise high with an entablature decorated with palmettes. Raised at the high pedestal is the figure of a soldier in contrapposto holding a flag in one hand and reaching for his sword with the other.

The plaque commemorates the sinking of the U.S.S. Maine, February 15th, 1898, and is cast from metal recovered from the wreckage. Along the north edge of the park there are two more small monuments. One, the Boone County Bicentennial Memorial, is made of granite and has had time capsules buried at its base.
